Sherry Campbell

When Fisherman's Mark needed extra support in our social services program, Sherry Campbell stepped in without hesitation. With a Master's in Rehabilitation Counseling and nearly 40 years of experience as a licensed professional counselor, Sherry brought a wealth of knowledge in mental health, addiction, domestic violence, and vocational rehabilitation. She has worked in hospitals, agencies, and private practice, and first connected with Fisherman's Mark through SAFE in

Earlier this year, when the organization faced a gap in staffing, Sherry served as our interim case manager for more than two months. In that role, she provided day-to-day support ranging from organizing files and managing calls to helping participants with both simple and complex needs. "I was surprised to find that many needs were very simple ones: managing bills, clarifying applications, screening mail, helping with basic technology," Sherry shared. "The more complicated issues almost always involved a lack of financial and/or legal resources or knowledge. There also seemed to be a lot of loneliness—sometimes people just wanted someone to talk to."

Her presence was deeply felt by both staff and participants. Executive Director Jennifer Williford described Sherry as "upbeat, with a can-do personality that was a true gift to all of us." Jenn added, "Sherry's background and skill set were invaluable in working with our participants. She was able to quickly analyze someone's situation and assist in the most kind and caring way." Sherry also supported the hiring process for our new social services manager and worked alongside Lauren to ensure a smooth transition.

Reflecting on the experience, Sherry emphasized the importance of seeing each individual not just as a social services participant, but as a neighbor. "We have a tremendous opportunity to help our community members, especially the more vulnerable ones," she said. "We must remember that these people aren't just participants—they are our neighbors who need respect and acceptance, a helping hand, a welcoming smile, and a chance to grow."

Jenn echoed that sentiment, noting her gratitude: "I'm forever grateful that we could use Sherry and her skill set during a challenging time for us. Her willingness to fill in allowed us to take our time to find the right fit in our next social services manager. This is a great example of us using volunteers to their fullest potential—with a very positive outcome."

Sherry continues to serve as a member of our Social Services Committee and remains a cherished part of the Fisherman's Mark community. "I was glad to be

able to 'help when help is needed' and to use my skills to help our clients," she said. "I strongly support Fisherman's Mark's mission, and love being a part of this growing organization."

Summer Recap



This summer was full of growth, nourishment, and community spirit at Fisherman's Mark.

- Our Wednesday Farm Stand welcomed 376 visits and distributed more than 6,100 pounds of fresh produce, thanks to the generosity of Rolling Harvest Food Rescue, Carversville Farm Foundation, America's Grow-a-Row, and Hungry Work Organic Farm. For low-income families, access to fresh food isn't just about nutrition — it's about dignity, choice, and opportunity.
- Through our FLY (Feeding Local Youth) program, we were proud to serve 1,600 balanced meals to children while school was out. For the first time, meals followed USDA MyPlate guidelines, offering grains, proteins, vegetables, fruits, and dairy — all overseen by our dedicated dietetic intern from Cedar Crest College.
- And thanks to our community's generosity, 222 backpacks were distributed through our 2025 Back-to-School Backpack Program, ensuring local students from preschool to high school started the year ready to learn. Read more about the program.

We are deeply grateful to our partners and supporters who make this work possible. Together, we're building a healthier, stronger community!




Back to School Success!
